The Global Challenge (3:10 - 3:15 PM ET)

• <u>Simon Kofe</u>, Minister of Transport, Energy, Communication and Innovation, Tuvalu, and <u>Yurshell Rodriguez</u>, Environmental Engineer & Climate Activist, Raizal Community, Colombia, introduce the topic of climate change and why they have been active in tackling it.

- Antonio Diaz Aranda, youth representative from <u>UNESCO's Youth Climate Action Network</u>, leads the first discussion round with Simon Kofe and Yurshell Rodriguez focusing on: "How do geography, technology, and institutions need to interact for humanity to successfully adapt and mitigate climate change?"
 - Simon Kofe: Tuvalu and other SIDS are on the frontlines of climate change. What solutions have emerged from your region that could inspire global climate adaptation efforts?
 - Yurshell Rodriguez: Indigenous communities have long practiced sustainable environmental management. What can we learn from Indigenous knowledge in mitigating climate change?

































Discussion Round 2 (3:35 - 3:50 PM ET)

- Valaythen Shreya, Student from Ebene SSS Girls School in Mauritius, leads the second discussion round with Simon Kofe and Yurshell Rodriguez focusing on: "How can youth be a main driver of global-scale change for the climate?"
 - Yurshell Rodriguez: Indigenous youth are leading climate justice movements worldwide. What are some ways youth can support and uplift Indigenous voices in climate activism?
 - Simon Kofe: Many youth from SIDS are calling for stronger climate finance and adaptation support. What steps can young people take to amplify these and other demands at a global level?

• Participants share actionable ideas on how young people can address climate change in their schools, homes, communities and the world.
